6. Fishery Statistics and other outstanding issues

The NAFO statistical database is at the NAFO Secretariat and available in computer diskette form or hard copies to the Contracting Parties.

Noting data reports are due on 15 May, for the preceding year of fishing, STATLANT 21A reports (preliminary annual catches in the NAFO Convention Area by species and divisions), have not been received from: for 1994 - USA (partial); for 1995 - USA (partial); for 1997 - Poland and USA (partial); for 1998 - Denmark (Faroes), EU-France (M), Lithuania, and USA.

Noting data reports are due on 30 June, for the preceding year of fishing, STATLANT 21B reports (final annual catches in the NAFO Convention Area by species, month, effort), have not been received from: for 1989 - EU-France (M); for 1994 - USA; for 1995 - Denmark (Faroes) and USA; for 1996 - Denmark (Faroes), and USA; for 1997 - Denmark (Faroes), Norway, Poland, Lithuania, and USA. For 1998, STATLANT 21B reports have only been received from Cuba, France (SP), EU-Germany, Japan, Korea, Latvia and Russia.

Salary levels were updated pursuant to contracts ratified by the Treasury Board of Canada and the Public Service Alliance of Canada. The contracts were for the period June 1997 to June 1999 and salary increases were retroactive to June 1997.

A change of venue for the June Scientific Council meeting resulted in increased meeting space costs. Also the implementation of a Local Area Network (LAN) at the Scientific Council meeting cost approximately \$5,000.
