In the context of efforts by the Coordinating Working Party for Fishery Statistics (CWP) to improve global fishery statistics, FAO and the NAFO Secretariat proposed an internal procedure which is believed will eliminate some of the existing discrepancies between the NAFO and FAO statistical databases for the NAFO Convention Area. This procedure foresees that in the case of inconsistencies for species under NAFO's responsibility, NAFO's data will supersede those reported to FAO. The reason is that NAFO receives much more detailed information and also receives updates and corrections more frequently. Reporting requirements to NAFO and FAO will not be affected in any way. CWP welcomed the initiative at its last meeting in February 2007. The Executive Secretary circulated a letter to this regard to all Contracting Parties on 3 July 2007 (GFS-07/250) and asked if anybody would object to such arrangement. No responses were received and the Secretariat will thus proceed as described.

7. Secretariat Internal Matters

→ Employees. In 2007, NAFO hired a new Office Manager, Ms. Lisa Pelzmann, and, for the first time, an IT Manager, Mr. George Campanis. The new staff members have qualifications that complement the existing expertise. Ms. Pelzmann, e.g. has a PR degree. Mr. Campanis' impressive programming and database skills have helped to develop the Secretariat's ability to analyze VMS summary information for the Scientific Council and to improve our existing databases.

→ Switch of VMS service provider (see STACFAD Working Paper 07/4). In 2007, NAFO switched its VMS service provider from Trackwell to Sirius IT, a company located in Copenhagen, Denmark. The new provider has offered NAFO for a competitive price a more user-friendly software package, unrestricted number of licenses, and an all-inclusive annual

fee which will help with budget stability and predictability. Currently, the new software is being tested. If by the end of December 2007 NAFO is not satisfied with this software and/or services, the contract includes an opt-out clause.

- → <u>Public Relations</u> (see STACFAD Working Paper 07/8). The Secretariat has continued with its efforts to enhance NAFO's visibility by producing information materials for the web and print and for various conferences and by remaining accessible to journalists and reacting promptly to their requests and to the public in general. The success of these efforts is reflected in the continuously high number of visits to the NAFO public website of 7,000 to 11,000 visitors per month (May to August 2007) (this number excludes crawlers). Among the top ranking pages were the IUU-List, the NAFO Symposium, the Conservation and Enforcement Measures, the Media Kit and the Convention Area Map.
- → Cooperation with other Organizations. Since the last Annual Meeting, the Executive Secretary was involved in the following 11 external activities: NEAFC Annual Meeting 2006, North American consultations on a possible International Mechanism of Scientific Expertise on Biodiversity (IMoSEB), Coordinating Working Party on Fishery Statistics (CWP), Fishery Resources Monitoring System (FIRMS), FAO Committee on Fisheries (COFI), Regional Fishery Bodies Secretariats' Network (RFS Network), Informal Consultations of States Parties to the United Nations Fish Stocks Agreement, and North Atlantic Regional Fisheries Management Organizations Secretariats (NARFMO). She also lectured at the International Ocean Institute, Dalhousie University in Halifax, and was an invited participant at the FAO Workshop on Vulnerable Deepwater Ecosystems and Destructive Fishing as well as at a CPPS Workshop on participatory rights of member states in RFMOs (Santiago, Chile).

Furthermore, the Information Manager, Ms. Barb Marshall, and the Office Manager, Ms. Lisa Pelzmann, attended the FSRS (Fishermen and Scientists Research Society) annual meeting in January 2007 in Truro, Nova Scotia, Canada with a poster on the NAFO efforts regarding an ecosystem approach. The Scientific Council Coordinator, Dr. Anthony Thompson, attended the IMoSEB Meeting in February 2007 in Montreal and, in his capacity as General Editor of the NAFO Journal, the ASFA Meeting in Mombasa, Kenya, in September 2007. The Senior Finance and Staff Administrator, Mr. Stan Goodick, attended the International Fisheries Commissions Pension Society Meeting in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada in April 2007.

→ <u>Professional Internship</u>. The Fisheries Commission Coordinator, Dr. Ricardo Federizon, went to CCAMLR for a two-week professional internship with CCAMLR. During this time, he received an in-depth introduction into the scope and set-up of CCAMLR as well as the tasks of the CCAMLR Secretariat, especially with regard to its MCS scheme. The internship was regarded as a success by both Secretariats as the exchange provided useful insights into the operations of the other organization as well as strengthening the contacts and cooperation among both Secretariats.
