However, during the past four years barely two third of the statistical offices actually submitted this information before the June meeting (see also SC reports)

In addition to serving the requirements of Contracting Parties, the Secretariat also continued to provide general information about NAFO to the public with the use of its website. The website continues to attract viewers on many topics including the IUU list, fishery statistics, the media kit as well as those wishing to read the latest Conservation and Enforcement Measures and access NAFO stock information. The Journal of Northwest Atlantic Fishery Science (JNAFS) website continues to flourish with articles being published as they are completed. The Secretariat is looking at improving the search ability of JNAFS articles. As well, historic meeting documents are being uploaded as time and server space permit and this will allow greater accessibility to all NAFO documentation.

The Secretariat was pleased to welcome Aureliano Gentile, a staff member of the FIES department at FAO, for a week long (20 - 24 July 2009) training seminar on XML and FIRMS. Two staff members from IATTC also attended the training. Mr. Gentile's stay in Dartmouth was made possible by the Secretariat's annual internship program. The Secretariat gained much from the training, in particular: the training has enriched the Secretariat's appreciation and understanding of the workflow, infrastructure and methodology of FIRMS. Furthermore, the training on XML has helped the Secretariat gain a better understanding of how to leverage XML when publishing documents to web and print.
