The United States Report on the Operation of the 10 Percent Annual Exemption to the Subares 5 Mesh Regulation, 1969

During calendar year 1969, annual exemption certificates were issued to 49 U.S. trawlers, 3 less than 1968. At year's end (December 31, 1969), 34 certificates were active (Table 1), 12 were temporarily suspended and 2 had been canceled. Trawlers of the U.S. are required by domestic regulations to suspend their annual exemption certificates and to remove all small meshed trawl note from the vessel when primarily engaged in catching fish under regulation.

Vessels in the 51 to 100 tonnage class continued to hold the greater number of exemption certificates. These are vessels which normally engage in the ground-fish fishery from October to April using large mesh trawl nets and from May to September fish primerily for silver hake using small mesh trawl nets.

A substantial shrimp fishery commenced in 1969 resulting in a change in the level of catch of codfish landed by exempted vessels, especially those landing in Gloucestar, Mass. From Table 2, it will be noted that the percentage of cod landed increased from 3.3 percent in 1968 to 8.4 percent in 1969. When computing the percentage of regulated fish landed by exempted trawlers, only the weight of finfish is used; therefore, the weight of any shrimp landed is eliminated from the calculations. The number of excess trips noted in Table 4 also reflects the change. The vessels involved in past years were engaged in fishing for silver hake, which were used when computing the allowable percentage of cod or of haddock.
